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1) Delta Dental of Arizona Foundation: Statewide Community Grants Program grant proposals – Deadline: December 10, 2009

Purpose: to support communities and organizations statewide that focus on oral health promotion and dental disease prevention programs serving children and youth (prenatal programs through age 18).

Eligibility: certified 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status from the IRS and are in good standing with the Arizona Corporation Commission. The Foundation funds public schools, federally recognized Indian tribes and their component agencies, and can make grants to governmental entities. Faith-based organizations that are registered charities or incorporated not-for-profits are eligible, provided the program or project is not religious in nature. The Foundation does not fund individuals as applicants.

2) Society for Public Health Education: Scholarships to State Health Policy Institute - Health Promotion Policy Experts – Deadline: December 15, 2009

Purpose: The State Health Policy Institute (SHPI) is a new Society for Public Health Education (SOPHE) initiative, in collaboration with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, which aims to form an elite corps of Health Promotion Policy Experts (HPPEs). HPPEs will be awarded training scholarships and will become specialists in educating their state legislators and other professionals on the latest policy and research in chronic disease prevention and control. They are seeking interested individuals who have a passion for this work and are looking to make a difference.

Eligibility: National SOPHE members

Amount of funding: If you are awarded a SHPI training scholarship you will be expected to participate in a one-day training on April 6, 2010 in Atlanta, GA, immediately preceding SOPHE's 2010 Midyear Scientific Conference.

Application process: The two (2) part application for this institute consists of 23 electronic questions as well as a two (2) page essay (to be submitted separately). Please note that once you begin the electronic application, you must complete the application in its entirety. You will not be able to save your information and return at a later time. Purpose: to solicit research projects to investigate the effectiveness of the State and community tobacco control policy and media interventions. Focal areas include secondhand smoke policies, tax and pricing policies, tobacco industry marketing and promotion, mass media countermeasures, and community and social norms. The proposed projects may address tobacco use and exposure in any form in the United States and may involve both observational and intervention studies. In addition, this FOA also solicits separate cooperative agreement applications for a Coordinating Center for this program. The Coordinating Center will provide the necessary scientific leadership and administrative framework to facilitate interactive and integrative collaboration and

communication among the awardees of individual Research Projects to be funded by this initiative and between the awardees and NCI staff.

Eligibility: domestic public and private nonprofit entities. For example, State and local governments, federally recognized American Indian/Alaska Native Tribes and tribal organizations, urban Indian organizations, public or private universities and colleges; and community- and faith-based organizations may apply. Tribal organization means the recognized body of any AI/AN Tribe; any legally established organization of American Indians/Alaska Natives which is controlled, sanctioned, or chartered by such governing body or which is democratically elected by the adult members of the Indian community to be served by such organization and which includes the maximum participation of American Indians/Alaska Natives in all phases of its activities. Consortia of tribal organizations are eligible to apply, but each participating entity must indicate its approval. The statutory authority for this program prohibits grants to for-profit agencies.

Purpose: to deliver peer-to-peer recovery support services that help prevent relapse and promote sustained recovery from alcohol and drug use disorders. Successful applicants will provide peer-to-peer recovery support services that are responsive to community needs and strengths, and will carry out a performance assessment of these services. RCSP is intended to support peer leaders from the recovery community in providing recovery support services to people in recovery and their family members, and to foster the growth of communities of recovery that will help individuals and families, achieve and sustain long-term recovery.

FOA will ensure that the health issues of underserved communities and populations are addressed using CBPR research strategies.

Purpose: to solicit Resource-Related Research Projects-Cooperative Agreement (U24) applications from institutions/organizations that propose to conceptualize, plan and pilot an innovative prototype of a national infrastructure to mentor individuals from diverse backgrounds who are conducting research relevant to the mission of the NIMH. In response to recommendations from the 2008 National Advisory Mental Health Council Workgroup on Research Training, the NIMH is encouraging creation of innovative national mentoring networks in scientific domains pertinent to the NIMH mission. It is expected that these networks will enhance the professional development of the participating individuals, sustain their career trajectory through research independence, and lead to scientific advances that will help transform the understanding and treatment of mental illness and HIV/AIDS.
