The fellow will compile RBHA, coalition and other strategic plans. The fellow will review and update the processes, procedures and logic model criteria that will be used at the State, Tribal and community levels for selecting and implementing evidence-based programs, policies, and practices beginning in SFY 2013. The fellow will compile all statewide strategic plans (HIDTA prescription drug plan, underage drinking prevention plan, marijuana prevention plan, Coalition of Military Families' strategic plan, universities' strategic plan, LGBTQ strategic plan; and T/RBHA, Coalition plans into the 2012-2017 Statewide Strategic Plan for Substance Abuse Prevention in Arizona. The fellow will conduct a review of policies and environmental strategies which are being used to reduce UAD and write an Arizona UAD report card.
