

Why is licensing regulation important?

- Quality child care versus babysitting.
- Health and safety inspections are conducted.

*Homes (twice a year)
*Center/Schools (once a year)

- > Complaints are investigated.
 - o (When regulations are allegedly violated)
- Health and safety regulations are maintained. (Fingerprinting, CPR, First Aid, Supervision, indoor/outdoor safety, staff to child ratio)
- Training requirements met for staff. (Studies show training is the variable that has the greatest effect on quality care.)
- Access reports to review inspections.

How do parents know if a program is regulated?

- > State License posted.
- Visit Department's website or call local Licensing Office to verify. (see back of brochure)
- Request to view the inspection reports at the child care facility or Licensing Offices.
- > Az Care Check

What can parents do if they have concerns or complaints?

- Discuss your concerns with the facility staff
- File a report online or by calling your local Licensing office.
- When a complaint is made, a findings letter may be mailed out to the complainant.
- Complainant may also review the findings by viewing recent inspection reports.

What type of child care is **not** regulated?

- Programs offering child care to 4 or less children for compensation.
- Home care from parents or blood relatives.
- Nanny or babysitting services in child's home.
- Places that offer child care while parents are on premises. (i.e. churches, work-out facilities, and stores)
- Some pre-school public school programs that are mandated to meet children's physical and mental impairments.
- Public, private, and charter schools offering education during school hours. (Kindergarten through 12th grade)
- State schools for the Deaf and Blind.
- Places that offer training in a specific subject.
 (i.e. Dancing, tutoring, drama, sports, and religion)
- Programs that allow schoolage children to arrive and leave by themselves.
